Your internship in Haiti will be a journey through many different experiences. Not only will you grow in the Lord, but you will also have many cross-cultural experiences with the Haitian people. You'll have the opportunity to help serve for one to three months with the Price family. We desire to plan ministry around how God has gifted the team. This could involve medical, construction, VBS, orphan care, evangelism and discipleship. When not assisting teams or being involved in other various ministries you'll experience the daily life of a missionary by attending churches, visiting new areas of ministry, grocery shopping, running errands, daily housekeeping, yard work, and all duties that keep a household running. Either way, you'll be able to invest in and influence people in different areas of ministry. Most importantly, you'll be building relationships with the local people, bringing them hope, encouraging them through your compassion, and showing them the love of Christ.

Maybe you're considering long-term ministry and you're not yet clear on what God has for your future. If you would like the opportunity to do more than a short- term missions trip, we can give you the chance to spend one to three months in Haiti.

I understand this is not a short-term mission trip but an internship which will allow me the experience of ministry and everyday life on the mission field.

I understand that I am in a foreign country and that I will be accountable to my missionary hosts when I am off the grounds and I will always get permission from them prior to leaving the grounds.

I agree to purchase Missionary Travel Insurance. Here is what we suggest. https://www.travelwithgallagher.com/. You'll also need to acquire a membership from HERO Ambulance for on the ground transport to the hospital. This is the only Ambulance service in Haiti and its run by Americans. We've found this to be invaluable if it is needed. The membership is inexpensive and worth it should you need it. I agree to abide by the dress code. I understand that during off hours, I need to be accessible to hosts or to the person or ministry that I may be of service to in other areas of ministry.

I understand that no boy/girl intimate relationships will be allowed while on this trip with other interns or Haitians. If you are caught pursuing a relationship in person or on social media or through word of mouth you will be sent home at your own expense.

I understand this is an incredible opportunity and I look forward to making the most of it. During my experience as an intern I will receive suggestions from hosts as not merely suggestions, but as the rules and guidelines that I must follow and obey. I expect to be held accountable for the rules and guidelines listed and if I cannot follow the rules, guidelines and expectations, hosts have the right to terminate my internship without refund of remaining funds.

INTERNSHIP COSTS

Thank you for your interest in an internship in Haiti. We pray you are as excited as we are to have you serve with us and that you are ready to bless and be blessed serving the Haitian people. We anticipate seeing God move in a mighty way in your life and the lives of the many people you are going to have an opportunity to touch. The cost of the internship is \$1250.00 per month which includes 2 meals per day, lodging, interpreters, ground transportation, and any ministry related needs. This does not include airfare, travel insurance, or an ambulance membership. Please bring your own snacks. You may buy them here; however, they are very expensive in Haiti.

DRESS STANDARDS

Our standards of dress are a combination of what is required by us and the Haitian culture. We desire to uphold our witness as a ministry and as Christians. We hope to be above reproach as we do ministry and serve the Lord here.

Men

Shirts are to be worn at all times. Pants must be at the waist. Long pants and collared shirt for church. Lightweight pants/shorts, consider the climate. T-shirts for other ministry

Women

Midriff must be covered at all times. One piece bathing suit or one that covers midriff area.

All tank tops must have one inch straps. Please refrain form low cut tops. Mid-length shorts.

Please remember you are in their country and we need to be respectful of their culture.



GETTING READY FOR HAITI

- Need one month payment sixty (60) days prior to arrival. Balance for remainder of internship due thirty (30) days before arrival. All payments must be made before arrival.
 - Need all routine vaccines up to date, Hep A, Hep B optional, Tetanus, Malaria and Typhoid.
 - Cipro prescription just in case it is needed.
- Need passport verify that it will not expire (you need at least 3 months left on expiration after you arrive home)
 - Mandatory missionary travel insurance. Here is what we suggest: https://www.travelwithgallagher.com/ and mandatory on the ground ambulance membership https://www.heroclientrescue.com/memberships-1.
- You will need 3 color copies of passport. Leave one in US with family or church, bring one to give to us to hold and one to keep with you.
- Driver's license for airport identification verification.

 Neck or waist pouch for passport, license, airline tickets, spending money.
- Fanny pack, back pack or small shoulder bag for keys, camera, snacks, glasses, hand sanitizer. ~Check luggage weight and liquid guidelines with your airline.
 Keep in mind – please consider taking items you won't mind leaving if you feel led to do so. Most items are expensive and unaffordable to the people of Haiti and missionaries.
- Pack liquid items in freezer bags you don't want to wear clothing that smells like shampoo or Pepto Bismol.
 - Borrow or bring inexpensive clothing.
 - Break in any new shoes before the trip. Bring a good pair of walking shoes i.e. tennis shoes or Chacos; cheap flip flops don't last long on this terrain.
- Take luggage you won't mind getting damaged.
 Carry one change of clothing or a least clean undergarments in a carry-on bag.
 Sometimes luggage can get lost or delayed.



THINGS YOU SHOULD KNOW ABOUT COMING HOME

Coming home from your trip doesn't mean that it's over. In all actuality, it's probably just beginning in a sense. As you go back and read through your journal that you hopefully kept in your host- country, you will probably learn more as you read through and seek what God is trying to teach you after your trip than you did when you were in country. Have a teachable spirit, don't be calloused towards God. The time after you come home can be the sweetest fellowship between you and God if you allow him to guide you.

When you arrive back in America, take some time to lay low for a while. Process the journey you have been on. Don't rush it, wait on God, he will teach you in his timing. Seek him constantly. Ask him to show you what he wants you to learn through this process of re-entry.

Don't feel the need to rush into ministry as soon as you get home. Yes, you're going to feel useless after living and breathing ministry for the past few months of your life. That's okay. Take however long you need to relax for a little while and spend the time that you would be serving and use it to spend time with God. You WILL need that. Before jumping into a ministry, prayerfully consider God's will. It's okay not to have a plan.

For a little while when you get home, you won't want to talk about your experience overseas, mostly because you're still trying to process it yourself. And that's okay...for

a little while. However, at some point, you will have to/need to spill your guts to someone. Find a friend, pastor, parent, counselor, anyone who cares about you genuinely, and just talk to them. Tell them about the hardest day you had in your host country. Tell them about the best day you had. Tell them about a native that touched your heart. Tell them whatever you feel like. If you find it hard to just talk about it in general, then get them to ask you questions about your time in country. I know for me, when people asked me questions, it was 10 times easier to talk about. Use the questions as a starting point, you'll probably find that just one question will open the floodgates.

Let's face it, people change. When you return, don't expect your friends to be the same people as they were when you left. Chances are, they have probably grown spiritually and made friends since you left. Just because you left for a little while, doesn't mean that life stopped for your friends. Life goes on. Don't expect them to immediately understand your experiences. Trust me, if they really love and care about you, they will desire to know about your trip, but they may not know how to express it. It's okay if they don't understand, you can still be friends. Grow through it with them. It will probably make your bond even stronger. Also understand that they had a hard time with you leaving. Be sensitive to that and let them know how much you missed them. On the other hand, you've changed and grown by leaps and bounds too. This period of coming home and figuring out how to be best friends again will be hard. Lots of grace and understanding will have to be exercised on both parts, but you're friends for a reason. Don't be closed off. They love you in the best way they know how at this point. Do the same for them.

Like I said, no one will 100% understand everything you've experienced and your struggle with re- entry. But you're not alone. There are PLENTY of missionaries who have come off of the field and have been through what you're experiencing now. LET THEM HELP YOU. Take their advice. Again, have a teachable spirit. Be willing to listen to what they have to say, it's valuable information.

God is a good listener. Vent to him. Get mad. Ask him questions. He can take it. He is a good God. You might never have answers to everything that happened in your time overseas, but he will give you a peace about it. God is a gentleman, he will wait for you to process. He will hold your hand on this journey. He's not going to leave you now that you're back in America. Talk to him. Comb through his Word. He gives greater grace (James 4:16b). He will always be there, even when you feel like no one else is. He is for you, not against you.

Living overseas is stressful, that's a fact. Some people actually struggle with PTSD after coming off the field long-term. Seek counseling, I swear it's normal. It's nothing to be embarrassed about, it's very real and very hard.

Don't suppress memories from your time overseas, no matter how much it hurts. Trying to forget will make it even worse. Let the memories hit you full-force, and remember everything thing that you can. It's okay to cry about it. Talk through it. Journal what you remember. Savor those moments.

It will end. You will finish processing your time in your host country. It might take a weeks, it might take months, it might take years, and that's okay. However, when the time comes, be okay with letting it go once you've learned everything that you can from this time in your life. Once you've finished processing, God will begin to prepare you for the next thing that he has for you whether it's starting college, getting a job, getting married, or going back to the field. Don't feel bad about being "finished" with this experience, it'll always be a part of you. It'll always be special to you, but you have to be okay with moving on. Even though this journey might be over, you'll begin a new one soon. He has wonderful plans for you. You will be okay.
